Fair Trade Fair: Maybe you were one of many parishioners delighted to get a jump on your Christmas shopping at the Fair Trade Fair at our Parish Center held on October 30. Organized by SCC members Sandi Ratajczak, Joyce Filipovitz and Dolores Badar, our Parish Center was transformed into a shopping mall filled with vendors who offered quality and unique fair trade products. Fair trade offers a sustainable shopping alternative by promoting just wages and fair profits for US and third-world workers and artisans. If you attended, you may have found the experience of talking with the vendors as enjoyable as the shopping. The vendors enjoyed sharing their stories about the benefits provided to

ST. CHRISTOPHER CHURCH'S ENDOWMENT

St. Christopher Catholic Church's mission states "a spirited community of faith dedicated to welcome, celebrate, care and grow in the image and likeness of Jesus." To ensure that St. Christopher Church's mission continues long into the future it has an endowment. An endowment is a fund made up of gifts and bequests that are invested to create a source of income for the parish. Traditionally, an endowment consists of a principal amount which is invested in a diversified portfolio and generates interest which can be used for immediate needs or designated items for the church and school.

St. Christopher Church has an Endowment Advisory Board that meets quarterly to review and oversee the endowment's activities. The Endowment Advisory Board oversees the Burse which is a depository for collection of gifts from permissible sources for the support of the St. Christopher Parish. The Burse is for the economic and spiritual support of the parish and not for normal operating expenditures. The committee works with an investment consultant who reviews performance, asset allocation and recommendations with respect to investments and rebalancing requirements. To ensure that St. Christopher Church continues to its important work we are offering parishioners an opportunity to support the endowment. Here are a few philanthropic ways to support St. Christopher Church's Endowment:

Planned Gifts – Making arrangements today for a future gift to benefit St. Christopher Church is a thoughtful gesture of gratitude that expresses your faith in our future. Planned giving can provide valuable tax benefits for the donor and provides St. Christopher Church with substantial, meaningful gifts. The following are a few ways to make planned gifts:

Bequests – Through your will or living trust, you can provide a legacy for causes that were an important part of your life. A will allows the donor to maintain complete control of assets during his or her lifetime with the knowledge that those assets will be distributed in accordance with the donor's plan and enacted upon death.

Charitable Lead Trusts – A Charitable Lead Trust provides current income to St. Christopher Church for a fixed period of time. The assets of the trust are then returned to the donor or the donor's designee. Properly structured, a CLT will allow assets to pass tax free from one generation of a family to another.

Life Insurance – A gift of insurance that names St. Christopher Church as the irrevocable beneficiary provides a tax deduction equal to the replacement value of the policy. If you continue to make premium payments on the policy, those also are tax deductible.

You can also support the endowment by making a donation in the weekly collection or a one time gift. These gifts can be restricted and the donor would designate the monetary support for the endowment. Non planned gifts can be made by giving cash and credit cards which have an instant impact on the growth of the endowment.

Gifts of Stock – An increasing number of donors are making gifts of securities to St. Christopher Church, taking advantage of the tax benefits this type of giving allows. To obtain the stock transfer instructions, please call Fr. John.

Matching Gifts – More than 4,000 companies match the gifts their employees and retirees make to nonprofit organizations. Your gift can double or triple if your company or your spouse's company participates in a matching gifts program. Contact your human resources office to find out if your employer matches charitable gifts.

LENTEN REFLECTION: BEING YOUR BEST SELF

On Wednesday, February 22, 2012, the Catholic church commemorates Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent, 40 days of preparation for the Easter celebration: the death and resurrection of our Savior Jesus Christ. For most of us, it is the annual period of prayer, fasting, abstinence, sacrifice and discernment, our annual attempt to be the best we can be. Lent is perhaps the most visible part of the Church year with Catholics everywhere displaying their ashes on the first day of Lent, discussing Lenten commitments, processing through neighborhoods for Stations of the Cross, and finally streaming into church on Easter Sunday in our finest and best clothing. During an era where Christian beliefs are being attacked more and more, Easter is a time when the media is particularly attentive to our religious traditions, providing positive coverage of our faith in action. Until recent years, Lent in action focused primarily on self-denial, "giving up" something that we favor so as to remind ourselves to prepare the way. As parents, we extend the expectation to our children: What are you giving up for Lent? As silly or superficial as this may now seem to us, it remains one of the most popular parts of Lent for believers and non-believers alike. Fortunately, our understanding of Lent has also evolved into long-term positive change to benefit those around us. Instead of "giving up" something mundane, we are now more likely to commit to doing something good and/or making a positive life change. People from all walks of life have adopted this spring period of renewal to make changes for the better. Once again, Christians have set an example for the world to follow.

If we take a moment to reflect upon the meaning of Lent, one does not have to go far or dig deep to find Lent in Action all around us, not only during the 40 days of Lent but throughout the year. Our church bulletin every week contains a plethora of opportunities and examples. For our youngest parishioners, our school, youth group and PSR program work daily to make the children active, giving members of the community. According to school principal Joyce Needham and her teachers, one program which helps the school to accomplish the task of teaching Catholic ideals to the students is called "Being the Best Version of Yourself." Designed by Matthew Kelly, the program helps children answer the question "Why am I here?" St. Christopher School is in its second year of using Mr. Kelly's materials. Based upon the characteristics described by Mr. Kelly (kindness, helpfulness, good manners, listening, participating), teachers nominate one student every month who demonstrates "the best version" of him/herself. Pictures are taken, certificates awarded and names listed in our church bulletin for the community to see. It is indeed a huge honor for students to receive this award. We can all adopt the main character's attitude as he states at the end of the guide book: "I am not perfect, but I am better today than I was yesterday and every day, in every way, I am working on becoming the best version of myself." What if we all adopted this goal as our Lenten commitment?

At the other end of the spectrum, we have the group of adults in our RCIA program who are preparing for full Communion with the church at Easter Vigil. With our team of leaders, they are also diligently working on becoming the best versions of themselves as new Catholics. Like the children, the excitement comes from knowing that they are doing the right thing, that they are joining a family of believers that will support and uplift their faith journey for many years to come.

According to the Gospels, Jesus spent 40 days fasting and preparing for his public ministry before His death and resurrection. Lent reflects upon that period for us. We are asked to repent and follow Christ, to fight the temptation to do wrong, accept the challenge

to do good. As Jesus accepted His cross, so are we to bear one another's burdens by becoming the best Christians we can be. The beauty of our present journey is that we do not travel it alone. We exist in a community of brothers and sisters that care about one another. As we approach the season of Lent, we can attend events and services at St. Christopher which will support this journey – Ash Wednesday, Stations of the Cross, Reconciliation/Penance, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil, and Easter Mass. Above all else, let's remember that if we commit to becoming the best versions of ourselves, we will truly be creating God's kingdom here on earth.

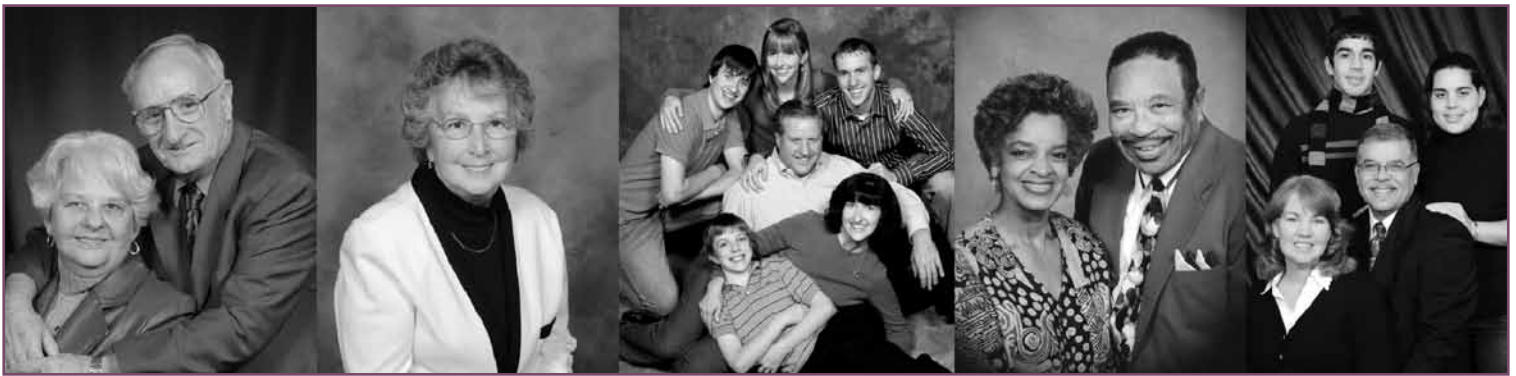
BECOME PART OF OUR PARISH DIRECTORY

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK CELEBRATES FAITH WITH FUN

From solemn prayer services to raucous trash can percussion performances, Catholic Schools Week was a lively celebration of faith, academics and service at St. Christopher.

“This week reinforces that what we do here is important and that our faith takes us through joyful and difficult times. Students learn the importance of sharing their faith,” said eighth-grade teacher Ralph Reznik, who organized the week’s events. “It gives us a right to brag. It’s an opportunity to share with everyone the good things we have done.”

The week began with a Sunday, Jan. 29 open house from 10 a.m. to noon for parish families and visitors. The school’s hallways were lined with student artwork, essays about faith and service, brief biographies about individual students and colorful class projects. Teachers and administrators were available to answer questions, offering insight about daily school activities.

At the beginning of the school year, lower-grade classrooms are paired with the upper-grade classrooms. Older students serve as mentors or “angels,” providing guidance for their younger peers. Following a Monday afternoon prayer service in the church, students participated in a classroom-to-classroom sharing exercise as the older students connected with the younger students. They read stories, played games, colored pictures and collaborated on word searches. All the activities pertained to Catholic Schools Week and focused on faith.

The importance of service was highlighted on Tuesday when students brought non-perishable food and monetary donations for the St. Colman Food Collection. Thirteen big boxes of food and \$550 in cash and gift cards were delivered to St. Colman that day.

Students spend several weeks practicing for the much-anticipated annual talent show and cherished dress-down day. The show began at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday and included 34 rehearsed acts. To encourage participation and the sharing of talents, none of the performances are judged. (No Simon Cowells allowed.) Group and solo acts took to the stage in the Parish Center. Students sang, danced, played instruments, acted and performed gymnastic feats. One student gave a nod to vaudeville when he performed his ventriloquist routine – a talent few students see these days.

Blue-and-orange day runs a close second to the thrill of a dress-down day. On Thursday, students shared their school spirit clad in St. Christopher spirit wear and school colors.

Friday’s morning rush and student drop-off was replaced with a casual social gathering in the Parish Center. Students brought their mothers to school for “Muffins & Mass with Mom,” sponsored by the PATHS Student and Family Activities Committee. Mothers, grandmothers, aunts and caregivers joined students for blueberry muffins, glazed doughnuts, coffee and orange juice, followed by a 9 a.m. all-school Mass. The guests sat among the children during the student-focused Mass. Blue-and-orange, hand-drawn posters, the readings and homily reflected on the week-long message of sharing faith, academics and service.

The school week ended with a bang, literally, when a busload of St. Edward High School students gave an energetic musical performance in the Parish Center. Hitting drumsticks on trash cans in rhythmic Stomp-like fashion, the St. Ed’s Trash-Talkers had the entire student body cheering for more. First-grader Keagan O’Brien (pictured, far right) won the support of his classmates when he unabashedly banged on a trash can and

danced during a competition with a veteran Trash-Talker. Students raved about the week’s finale after the Trash-Talkers boarded their bus home after their fifth exhausting performance of the day.

A professional D.J. provided music, games and prizes for the 103 participants. Additional funds were raised through a bake sale. Second-grade teacher Kathy Rohn organized the event.

“We raised \$470 for El Salvador missions,” Rohn said. “We held the dance to have fun, to raise awareness about poverty in El Salvador and to support Fr. John Ostrowski’s mission work.”
